HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE THROUGH LIFE TRANSITIONS AND "TOUGH STUFF"

What is tough stuff for young children? Sharing, sitting at circle time, and putting on shoes to go outside can seem challenging for some little bodies. Now imagine being a little one whose parents are struggling to put food on the table, or a child who recently moved or just had a younger sibling born. Now add to these daily struggles and life transitions, the impact of going through a pandemic for most of your life. That is exactly what our 3-5 years olds are going through. Not only are many children facing an increased risk for adversity, but many may also be going through their daily lives with additional stress and trauma that could be impacting their ability to participate in regular childcare routines without us knowing. In this workshop, participants will go through common and not-so-common challenges children may face. discuss how childcare environments and curricula impact these children, and provide inclusive, trauma-informed strategies to support their needs

Presenters: Ana Valle Rivera

Ana is a proud mother of three, a public speaker, a consultant, and the founder of Early Years Thriving. Since 2007 Ana has worked with diverse children and families with complex needs using inclusive and trauma-informed approaches. Ana has a background in ECE, a Bachelor's Degree in Child & Youth Care, and is currently completing a Master's Degree in Professional Education in ECE.

CREATING CALM AND COMMUNITY: THE POWER OF ENVIRONMENT & SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING IN CHILD CARE

Explore how to create a calm and nurturing childcare environment that promotes emotional well-being. We will look at the environment as the third teacher, and examine how thoughtfully designed spaces can enhance learning and foster a sense of belonging. Lastly, we will discuss the principles of Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and how they can be integrated into daily practices of your program, helping children feel valued and included. Through interactive activities and practical strategies, attendees will leave equipped to implement strategies and promote community in their program.

Responsible Adult

20 Hour Child Care Training Course



Monday - Friday September 15th - September 26th, 2025 10:00AM-12:00PM • Online • Fee: \$20.00 Suitable for child care providers and child care workforce.

Presenter: YMCA CCRR Consultant

This course meets the requirements of 20 hours training to become a "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers child development, guiding behaviour, health, safety, nutrition and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have video and audio capabilities, as well as participate and attend all sessions in order to receive the certification at the end of the course.

To sign up for this course participants must:

- Be 19 years of age
- Have minimum Grade 8 English written and oral skills
- Attend all scheduled sessions

Once the training is complete, participants are eligible to work as a Responsible Adult in:

- School-age Child Care Programs
- Licensed Family Child Care
- As additional support or substitute in Licensed Preschool and Licensed Child Care Programs
- Summer Camps

INDIGENOUS RESOURCES, PEDAGOGIES AND RELATIONSHIPS! OH MY!

Thursday, September 18th, 2025 • 7:00-9:00PM • Online • Fee: \$5.00 • Suitable for child care providers, child care workforce and parents.

As an early childhood educator, you might be the first point of contact for many Indigenous families who are entering an educational setting for the very first time. You play a critical role. It's a big responsibility and it is also a gift!

In this workshop, we will explore the following key themes:

- Where can I find authentic Indigenous resources that celebrate and reflect the diversity of Indigenous communities throughout Canada? How can I use them effectively?
- How can I use Indigenous pedagogies like storytelling, circle, land-based teachings in my program? Can I use a drum if I am not Indigenous?
- What is an elder/knowledge keeper and how can I invite them to visit my program?
- What are best practices for connecting and building strong relationships with Indigenous families?

You will leave this session understanding that you are already doing so many things right and more importantly, you'll leave with ideas that you can start using right away.

Nadine McSpadden is a retired teacher with over 22 years of experience in Indigenous education. She is a proud member of the Secwepemc Nation and currently serves as a Faculty Associate at UBC. Nadine also works as a consultant with Len Pierre Consulting and partners with WildCraft Dyeing to offer workshops on natural dyeing, grounded in Indigenous ways of knowing and being. She is a passionate advocate for embedding Indigenous perspectives into education, and her work reflects a deep respect for culture, community, and land.



WORKING EFFECTIVELY IN MULTICULTURAL AND MULTI-CARE TEAMS IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (4 DAY COURSE)


WHERE
